eady building a global software development company with a turnover 30 million US dollars. Their projects go to more than 20 countries across five continents.

Of course, they had to work very hard to make their mark on the global platform. "Initially, we did not have clients. At first, we worked on small projects in India. Then gradually larger projects started coming our way," says Arunit.

macy for cyber safety. "We had certain web sites and restrict the web access. "We developed such a software and got a lot of publicity. Then, we got our first foreign client who wanted similar software and a series of client relations started," he recounts.

From 2006, CIS became a complete outsourcing company. Even though they have highly unskilled technical staff working for them, the founders still put in 10 hours every day. So how do they survive?
